The Battle of Klushino: The Coin of Remembrance

Along with Fourth of July celebrations in America, comes the remembrance of the great Battle of Klushino in Poland, which took place on July 4 of 1610.

The war was fought between the Poles and a combined Russo-Swedish army, but this particular battle was the major turning point of the war. This was mainly due to the winged hussars — the Polish cavalry, which were renowned for bearing feathered wings that whistled in the wind and frightened and intimidated the enemies' mounts. Not only was this battle key to Polish victory, it is also considered to be one of the greatest triumphs in Polish history.

To honor this mighty battle and victory Poland achieved, a 500 złoty coin in honor of the Polish commander, Stanisław Żółkiewski, was minted for the "Hetmans of the Polish Commonwealth" series. These were released by the Mint of Gdańsk on June 12, 2025, with a diameter of 32mm, and weighing 31.10g.

Pictured on the obverse of the coin is Commander Żółkiewski, as shown in the picture below. On the reverse, an inscription half-circles the coin: "RZECZPOSPOLITA POLSKA", which translates to "REPUBLIC OF POLAND". Following the date, 2025, at the base of the coin, 500 złoty marks its face value. Within the half-circle of the words "RZECZPOSPOLITA POLSKA" is a

beautiful Polish eagle, and Commander Żółkiewski's coat of arms and mace.



With only 1,000 of these coins minted, each in proof quality with high relief, the numismatic value far exceeds the face value of 500 złoty, which is equivalent to \$137.90 USD. The coin is listed for sale under the Mint of Gdańsk website for PLN 15,899.00, which equals \$4,384.47 USD.

The coin, a new addition to the "Hetmans of the Polish Commonwealth" series, is considered a valuable addition to

any collection, and provides both a beautiful remembrance of the Polish victory at the Battle of Klushino, as well as Żółkiewski's bravery.

The Polish Batman; Token Honoring Charles Frank Zmuda, Air Show Performer from the Early Days of American Aviation

Polonia can claim a number of illustrious individuals, particularly in the United States. One somewhat-off-the-beaten-path individual would be Charles Frank Zmuda (1914-1959) who at one time was known as the "Batman." Zmuda was from a Polish immigrant family who originally resided in Palo, Michigan. Zmuda was actually the second "Batman," following in the footsteps of his friend, Clements "Chem" Sohn (1910-1937) a son of German immigrants who originally lived in Fowler, Michigan. Both men performed for Art Davis who operated an aerial circus, known as the "Art Davis Air Show" or alternatively the "Art Davis Flying Circus," out of Lansing, Michigan, where both Zmuda and Sohn once lived. The Art Davis Air Show travelled extensively performing a daredevil act in which Sohn and later Zmuda, would wear batwings made of a canvas like material – zephyr cloth, which was mounted on steel tubes, forming a large web under each arm which was clasped to the man's hips. Another loose cloth formed a web between the man's legs which acted

like a bat's tail. The costume was topped off with large goggles, which, according to the imagination of the day, gave the man a bat-like appearance.

It was in this getup that the aerial daredevil would jump from a plane at a height of about 20,000 feet, and would use this apparatus to soar through the air like a bat. At about 900 feet from the ground, the daredevil would open his parachute for the final descent. If it sounds dangerous, it was, Clem Sohn was killed when his chute failed to open while performing this act at an airshow in Paris, France in 1937.

Incredibly, after this tragedy, Zmuda took up the wings, literally, and began performing in in Sohn's place. During his performing lifetime, Zmuda would clock more than 200 documented jumps. Although he was injured a number of times as batman, he survived this stage of his career, eventually giving up the daredevil lifestyle for the comparatively more sedentary life as a pilot for American Airlines flying out of Midway-Chicago.

An undated token promoting Art Davis's Air Show, Art Davis, and Charles Zmuda likely was issued in the late 1930-40's featuring a portrait of Davis on the obverse, with the inscription "SOUVENIR COIN" around the upper periphery of the token, and "ART DAVIS LANSING MICH." along the lower rim. Arthur "Art" Davis (1895-1979) was a renowned military pilot, barnstormer, stunt flyer, racer and all-around aviation expert. Among his aviation ventures, he owned and operated his own stunt flying business, the Art Davis Flying Circus.

On the token's reverse, Charles Zmuda appears, in full batman costume, wings spread. The inscription "HAPPY LANDING," appears around the upper rim, probably wishful thinking when one considers the tragedy experienced by Sohn. The abbreviated name, "CHAS. ZMUDA,"

appears under the frontal, full-body costumed portrayal of Zmuda, on the lower rim. Additional inscriptions, "MADE IN U.S.A." appear in smaller letters to the left of the batman figure, while "GRAMMES" the name of the manufacturer, appears in smaller letters to the right. The token is made of brass and measures 25mm. It's not an uncommon token, but like other tokens of this sort, can be challenging to find in the numismatic market place when one is looking for one. However, with patience they do show up with some regularity at token and medal shows, as well as on online sites such as eBay.

This interesting little piece of Americana offers a tangible artifact of a long-lost time of aerial daredevils and a simpler, bygone era, in American history. It also honors a plucky Pole from Palo, Michigan, who literally took up wings.


